Unsung but Sung: The Role of Opera Librettists

Opera wouldn't be opera without a good story set down in words that can be beautifully sung. In fact, the story is significant enough that a recent survey found that it is most often the *story* that drives us to attend an opera performance. This alone would argue for equal billing with the composer for the unsung hero or heroine: the librettist.

The job of the librettist, in the words of contemporary lyricist Mark Campbell is "to tell a story through music." He adds, "My second job is to see that the composer has all that he or she needs to tell that story ... My words must inspire the composer."

Jeanine Tsori (composer of *Blue*, with librettist Tazewell Thompson, and *Grounded* with George Brant) advocates that composer and librettist should receive equal billing. Whenever she mentions her works she gives credit to her librettists.

We know from correspondence, archival materials, and secondary sources that librettists of the past played many roles. Most often they were poets or other writers who condensed novels, plays, poems, and other stories, into poetic texts that could be put to music. It is no small task to condense a dramatic work like *Othello* into a performable work with beauty and economy of language, a length tolerable by the audience, and loyalty to the original work. But at the same time, librettists also served the composers in many other ways – negotiating with censors, working with impresarios, tweaking the material to suit specific singers, and navigating the creative process with brilliant, passionate composers. The best collaborations are like artistic miracles!

So who were some of the most notable librettists from the perspective of opera-goers? Here are six names that might constitute the beginning for a librettists' hall of fame and some of our favorite composers with whom they worked:

- Pietro Metastasio, 1698-1782 (Handel, Haydn, Mozart, Pergolesi & Salieri)
- Lorenzo Da Ponte, 1749-1838 (Mozart)
- Felice Romani, 1788-1865 (Donizetti & Bellini)
- Arrigo Boito, 1842-1918 & Francesco Maria Piave, 1810-1876 (Verdi)
- Luigi Illica, 1857-1919 (Puccini & Giordano)
- Sir William Schwank Gilbert (1836-1911) (Sullivan)

Although those of us who aren't fluent in the language of the librettist's work may not fully appreciate the poetry, we can appreciate the music, the story, and the flow of the words that are sung.

Here are a few examples:

- Lorenzo Da Ponte wrote the libretto for an opera that we'll hear this fall in Sarasota. *Così fan tutte*, composed by Mozart, includes a beautiful trio 'Soave sia il vento' ('May the wind be gentle') in which two women, believing their lovers are leaving for military service, wish them smooth sailing. The third person in the trio, Don Alfonso, is not on the women's side; he has orchestrated a bet that they will be unfaithful in their lovers' absences for fictional military service. - Felice Romani penned the libretto for Bellini's *Norma*. Known for his ability to write poetry both dramatic and brief, Romani wrote both tragic and comic works. Here is a duet from *Norma* featuring Renata Scotto and Mirella Freni. - It is said that Arrigo Boito was "one of the very few great librettists, his best work being done for Verdi," and that "the libretto for *Falstaff* is sometimes regarded as the finest which any composer has been given."

 Here is a comic scene where Alice and Meg discover that Sir John Falstaff has made the same overture to both women, and they, and their comrades, begin to plot revenge. Listen here https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=amJp_LowcM0

Known for their seemingly zany, though politically critical works, Gilbert's words and Sullivan's music are staples of operetta. The lives and careers of librettists are interesting in their own rights, and works such as *The Librettist of Venice: The Remarkable Life of Lorenzo Da Ponte* by Rodney Bolt (New York: Bloomsbury, 2006) and David Kirkpatrick's thesis *The Role of Metastasio's Libretti in the Eighteenth Century...*(Florida State University, 2009) provide both background and insight.

So next time you listen to an opera, remember how the story got into the form that you hear, and salute the unsung hero in the making of the opera!
